MIDDLETOWN MATTERS

Code Enforcement & Inspections Boosted for Sandy Impacted Properties

A \$100,000 state grant will be used to augment code enforcement and building inspections for Sandy-damaged properties. After Superstorm Sandy hit New Jersey in 2012, hundreds of homes throughout Middletown's Bayshore were damaged. Many property owners have made good progress in repairing, elevating and rebuilding their homes. Many others are just getting underway while many more remain abandoned.

"The township is experiencing near unprecedented levels of construction activity which has stretched our staff very thin," said Construction Official Joseph Kachinsky.

Grant funds will be used to hire additional code enforcement staff to monitor abandoned properties to ensure that they are maintained adequately and that they do not become a nuisance to neighbors. In

many cases, these properties are now in the hands of banks, mortgage companies and absentee owners. It takes a lot of diligence and tracking to make sure these properties are given the attention they need and that the neighbors deserve, he said.

"We'll also be able to give homes that are under reconstruction expedited inspections. We want to do whatever we can to speed up the rebuilding process for our residents who have already been displaced and inconvenienced far too long," said Mayor Stephanie Murray. "We appreciate that the state has recognized the need to help municipalities provide specialized assistance to Sandy-impacted residents and property owners. We think this will go a long way towards helping our community to fully rebuild."

Shedding Light on Township Parks

Let there be light, but only when you need it. Push-button starts are being added at township basketball, roller hockey and tennis courts. One has already been installed at the basketball court at Middletown Thompson Park. The lights will stay on for one hour when activated year round. However, in keeping with park regulations, the lights can only be activated 30 minutes before sunset until 10:00 p.m. A warning strobe will go off 15 minutes before the hour is up letting visitors know they need to tap the button again if they're still using the court.

Message from the Mayor

Middletown: Our American Story

It's May 1777. Amidst high tension and the escalation of clashes, a brave group of colonists met to decide whether it was just to take up arms against the British. At the time the consensus to do so was a bold action of defiance with the British magistrate only a few doors down.

By 1780 Joseph Murray is murdered on his land by Tories for his actions against the crown as member of the local militia. He is buried as a Patriot in the Old First Church graveyard on Kings Highway as one of the local heroes of the American Revolutionary War.

Visit Middletown today and you can see his barn, which is on the National Register of Historic Places, and farmhouse at Poricy Park.

Middletown's story has always been inspiring to me because it is so inherently American. I hope that sense of wonder and pride is something we can all share. From the earliest days of our pioneering settlers who braved the unknown and wilderness to the tumultuous revolutionary period to the raucous days of when we both cavorted with and fought against pirates, our residents have always

embodied fierce independence and grit. Yet they somehow managed to get along with each other despite cultural and religious differences to become one of the most prosperous economic centers in early America. This the American Spirit. This is our town – Middletown. I encourage everyone to get to know Middletown's history because it weaves our unique tapestry into the American story.



Middletown Day 2015

Today communication is what bridges the gap between government and its citizens. In that vein, we have updated our already award-winning website. It's now mobile compatible and offers better options to personalize information delivery. The site also allows residents to send pictures along with service requests.

In this newsletter you'll find a more comprehensive look at our tax bill, how Middletown compares to Monmouth County and the state, updated recycling information, and details on services offered by our Clerk's Office.

Township Briefs

New Website Launched

The township has launched a new website that enhances communications between residents and local government. Residents will continue to receive alerts from the township about emergencies and other important happenings by phone, email and/or SMS text. A new feature, Notify Me, offers customized email notifications about website updates. Visit www.middletownnj.org/register to create personalized accounts.

Bray Ave. Bridge Replacement Update

Monmouth County has awarded a construction contract for replacement of the Bray Ave. bridge. The project is scheduled to start this year. The county had to close the bridge after Superstorm Sandy due to structural damage. A \$2 million allocation from the Federal Emergency Management Agency will fund 90 percent of the project cost, with the remainder being provided by Monmouth County.

Inclusion Program Gets Grant

For the second consecutive year Middletown's Summer Recreation Inclusion Program will be bolstered with a \$20,000 award from the state Recreational Opportunities for Individuals with Disabilities (ROID) grant program. The program was started in 2013 to give children with various disorders the opportunity to participate in a summer camp alongside their peers.

Mulch Delivery Service A Success

The township's mulch delivery service has made over 250 deliveries since it began this spring. The Public Works Department will deliver truckloads of mulch directly to your home or business. Cost is \$30 per truck load (5 cubic yards). Deliveries must be paid and scheduled in advance. Subject to availability and weather. Call 732-615-2008 for more information.

Donate to the Mayor's Food Basket

The Mayor's Food Basket will return this holiday season with a goal of collecting more than a ton of food. Mayor Stephanie C. Murray is partnering with the Health Department's Social Services Division to help Middletown families in need. Look for donation bins at township facilities, events and local businesses. All types of canned/non-perishable foods and personal hygiene products are needed. All donations go to Middletown families.

New Grants for Poricy Park

Two grants have been received for Poricy Park. One for \$23,000 from state Historic Preservation Office will be used to develop a preservation plan for the 18th century Murray Farmhouse. The other for \$2,500 from NJ American Water will be used to mitigate erosion at Murray Pond.

Home Rehab Grants Available

If you are a Middletown homeowner with a low or moderate income, you may be eligible for a grant of up to \$25,000 from the township's Home Rehabilitation program. Call 732-615-2281 for details.

Township Planning New Road Improvements

Improvements to more than a dozen township roads are making their way to the drawing board this year. Scheduled improvement projects include:

Kings Highway from Red Hill Road to Route 35; Cooper Road from Route 35 to Sleepy Hollow Road; Main Street, from Murphy Road to Route 36; Railroad Avenue from Seeley Avenue to East Road; drainage improvements at various locations; miscellaneous paving and concrete work.

The township also plans to complete the design and permit work for future improvements to East Road, Tindall Road and

Bamm Hollow Road. Design work can include preparing plans and job specifications, survey work and coordination with utilities.

Additional projects included in the 2015 Capital Plan are: Improvements at Poricy Park including classroom enhancements and construction of a pavilion for public events; design of synthetic turf field at Croydon Hall; design of the Stevenson Park Bridge; acquisition of a fire truck that capable of accessing dwellings in the Bayshore that had to be elevated as a result of Superstorm Sandy.

Neighborhood Spotlight Shines Bright

Everybody enjoys a little extra attention now and again. That's why the Mayor and Township Committee have launched Neighborhood Spotlight, a program that focuses on the uniqueness of Middletown's neighborhoods as well as the interests and concerns of its residents. The program includes outreach sessions at venues within Middletown's neighborhoods. Dates are announced on the website monthly. Residents are encouraged to stop by to discuss any neighborhood issues they may be concerned.

Using High Water Marks to Raise Flood Awareness

Middletown will be working with Monmouth County and Monmouth University's Urban Coast Institute to develop public outdoor signs that show high water marks from past floods. The project is part of the township's outreach program designed to create greater flood risk awareness. The township participates in the National Flood Insurance Program's Community Rating System (CRS). Middletown holds a Class 6 rating for taking actions that exceed the standards of the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). As a CRS community, Middletown homeowners purchasing or renewing flood insurance policies may be eligible for a discount on their policies. Help Reduce Non-Point Source Pollution

Non-point source pollution is a contamination of our ground water, waterways, and ocean that results from everyday activities such as fertilizing the lawn, walking pets, changing motor oil and littering. But there's good news — we can make simple changes to keep our environment clean. Check out the tips below and visit www.middletownnj.org/stormwater for more information.

- Place litter, including cigarette butts and fast food containers, in trash receptacles.
- Avoid overuse of fertilizer which contain nitrates and phosphates.
- Recycle all used motor oil by taking it to a local public or private recycling center.
- Consider natural and less toxic alternatives to common household products and pesticides whenever possible. Contact your County Solid Waste Management Office about household hazardous waste collection.
- Wash your car only when necessary and use a non-phosphate detergent.
- Dispose of pet waste in the garbage or toilet.
- Inspect septic tanks annually and pump it out every three to five years depending on its use.
- Boat owners should always use marine sanitation devices and pump-out facilities at marinas.

A Closer Look At Our Tax Bill

A **Assessed Value** is the value assigned by the municipality for the purpose of levying taxes. The tax bill shown here represents a bill sent to a property owner with an overall average assessment for the township.

B **The General Tax Rate** is a multiplier used in determining the amount of tax dollars levied upon each property. It is expressed as \$1 per \$100 of taxable assessed value. This rate is used to compute the tax bill. It is derived from the amount that is to be sent to each entity or set aside for the specified purpose.

C **County Tax:** This amount will be sent to Monmouth County to help fund a \$488 million budget set by the Monmouth County Board of Chosen Freeholders, a separately elected body. County services include bridges, roads, parks, law enforcement and human services.

D **District School Budget:** The amount will be sent to the Middletown Township Public School District to fund a \$164,298,191 million budget set by the Middletown Township Board of Education, a separately elected body. The district maintains 2 public high schools, 3 middle schools and 12 elementary schools. It represents 62.41 percent of the total tax bill this property owner will pay.

E **Municipal Tax:** The amount provided to township to help fund a \$69,437,316 million budget that includes library services. It helps pay for police, fire, snow removal, leaf and brush collection, road repairs and maintenance, animal control, and all other township services, while supporting over 40 parks and recreation facilities, the senior center and the recycling center.

F **Municipal Open Space:** This voter-approved tax funds maintenance of the township's parks and open spaces.

G **County Open Space Tax:** This is a voter-approved tax that funds maintenance of open spaces throughout Monmouth County.

H **Municipal Library Tax:** This amount is provided directly to the Middletown Public Library. Middletown maintains its own library and is not part of the county library system.

I This is the **total tax bill for 2015**. It is calculated by multiplying the assessed value by the general tax rate and dividing by 100.

J **This property owner** is a veteran and a senior citizen so he gets a \$500 deduction on his total tax bill. Applications for these deductions can be obtained from the Tax Collector's Office (Senior Citizen) and Tax Assessor's Office (Veterans).

K **Tax payments are divided into quarters-** The bill contains the amounts for the remaining two (August and November) 2015 quarters and the preliminary quarterly amounts for the first two quarters (February and May) for 2016. To

arrive at the amounts for the remaining 2015 quarters, you would start with the total amount due for 2015 (assessment multiplied by the general tax rate divided by 100), reduced by the amounts previously paid in February and May, then equally divided into two payments. The preliminary amounts for 2016 are calculated using the total 2015 tax amount billed, divided by 4. That amount is then applied to the first two quarters as the preliminary billing.

L **State Aid** is received by municipalities to help reduce property taxes. The amount of state aid received is determined by a formula set by the state government.

A Message from the Tax Collector

The last day to pay November 2015 taxes without interest is by 4:00 p.m. November 10th. You may pay on-line by check or credit card at www.middletownnj.org.

Due to the accelerated tax sale process, and for the November tax quarter only, personal checks, on-line check payments or credit card payments will be accepted until 4:00 p.m. November 10th. All payments received after 4:00 p.m. on November 10th must be made with certified funds. Certified funds are cash, bank cashier checks or money orders. Tax sale will be held Tuesday, December 29, 2015.

Payments not accepted day of sale.

The deadline for applications for the 2014 Property Tax Reimbursement (Senior Freeze) Program has been extended to October 15, 2015. To listen to information or to order an application, call 1-800-323-4400.

Application packets for the 2013 Homestead Benefit will be mailed by the state in early September. The filing deadline is October 30, 2015. Visit the Division www.state.nj.us/treasury/taxation/ or call the automated telephone filing system at 1-877-658-2972 for information.
