Message from Mayor Tony Perry



While I am writing this message as the mayor of Middletown, I am also writing this as a father of three young children. Like you, it is my hope to preserve and protect our incredible and picturesque town. For many years, we have been consistently ranked as one of the best towns to live in and raise a family. It is my goal to keep it this way, and why I refuse to stop fighting for open space preservation. The Township Committee and I will not relent to developers that want to build massive high-density housing. It is our commitment and duty to pass this town on to the next generation, not just better than how we found it, but as a shining example of what is possible not by government but by an empowered community.

Four years ago, we asked residents to make the investment in preserving open space in Middletown, whether that is in Belford, Port Monmouth, River Plaza, Lincroft, or anywhere in between. More than 66 percent of you voted to approve the Open Space referendum.

With your support, we were able to forever preserve the historic Conover Beacon in Leonardo. With your support, we restored one of America's oldest farmhouses at Poricy Park in Oak Hill. With your support, we have preserved more open space and have been able to invest more in enhancing our recreational facilities than ever before — but our mission is not yet complete. It is only just beginning!

At a time when Americans are facing record inflation and prices, we understand the financial challenges in the continued investment of this request. However, I know that we all love our town too much to let it fall from its long-held position as one of New Jersey's best places to live. We are fortunate to have 80 parks across town, including one national park, nine County parks, and 70 Township parks. This is an impressive total of approximately 6,000 acres. Continuing to preserve our remaining open space, including enhancing our parks and preserving our historic landmarks, is a top priority.

The Open Space tax levy is approximately \$5 million, which means that each resident currently pays approximately \$73 per year toward the Open Space Trust Fund. Our commitment to preserving open space has been substantial, with a total investment of over \$30 million. Since we began the trust over two decades ago, the Township has proudly acquired and preserved 275 acres of land.

More than a decade ago, the Township purchased 44 acres of the Tretter property for \$2.1 million, a 67 wooded acres tract of land off Whippoorwill Valley Road that has remained largely undeveloped since the 18th century. We are now trying to purchase the remaining 23 acres. In 2022, the Township purchased the 20 acres of land that make up Fairview Fields for \$2.2 million. In October, the Township Committee introduced an ordinance to preserve 17 acres in River Plaza (\$2.1 million) to complement a more pedestrian-friendly walkway already in design with the added benefit of a scenic view of the Navesink River. We were also able to preserve one of the last remaining pieces of open space on Route 36 (\$70,000), a forested parcel that is located near the iconic Polar Bear Ice Cream stand.



Last year alone, we were able to use about \$568,000 toward park improvements, such as the basketball courts across town and Kunkel Skate Park. The Township made over \$3.1 million of investments at Tindall Park, including renovating the tennis and pickleball courts and creating a dog park. In November, the Township Committee and I hope to have your support to increase the annual collection from three cents to four cents. Please help us paint the canvas of a better Middletown and ensure that our town continues to hold on to its rustic charm and historic beauty. It is our responsibility to uphold our home's legacy, and we sincerely encourage you to join us in this crucial fight.

As the Township's LOSAP Coordinator, John's time and talents are unmatched and appreciated by every dedicated volunteer, especially his peers in the world's largest all-volunteer fire department. In addition to his work with LOSAP, John now oversees the Middletown Emergency Volunteer Incentive Program. His service, leadership, and advocacy is an inspiration to us all.



Middletown Remembers 23rd Anniversary of 9/11

On Wednesday, September 11th, Middletown Township held a silent memorial and wreath tribute at the Middletown World Trade Center Memorial Gardens to honor the 37 residents we lost 23 years ago and the individuals who have passed from 9/11-related illnesses.

The Middletown Township Police Department's Honor Guard and members of the Middletown Township Committee, USS NEW JERSEY (SSN 796) sailors, VFW Post 2179, and American Legion Post 515 began the ceremony with a wreath tribute. After the wreaths were placed, Middletown Township Fire Chief William Kane Jr. rang a bell 37 times in memory of each resident whose life was taken on that tragic day.



After the bell tolled, hundreds of people, including 9/11 victims' loved ones, Township Committee members, sailors, local dignitaries, first responders, veterans, and community members, lit candles and walked through the Gardens which were illuminated by luminarias.

Prior to the memorial service, Middletown PBA Local 124 held its 4th annual 9/11 Memorial 5K on Saturday, September 7th.

Community Shows Support for USS NEW JERSEY (SSN 796) Commissioning

On Saturday, September 14th, the USS NEW JERSEY (SSN 796) was officially commissioned at U.S. Naval Weapons Station Earle in Leonardo. This nuclear-powered submarine is the third warship named after New Jersey and is the first fast-attack submarine designed to be fully integrated for both men and women. Mayor Tony Perry was incredibly humbled to deliver the welcome remarks to the thousands in attendance at this historic event. In the days leading up to the commissioning, our community showed tremendous support for the crew members by welcoming the submarine at Sandy Hook and thanking the sailors for their service throughout the week, as well as local businesses offering discounts.



As a thank you for the town's support, Peter Engelmann, the president of the USS NEW JERSEY Commissioning Committee, presented the Township Committee with a painting of the submarine driving into Sandy Hook. There are also two previous USS NEW JERSEY boats in the painting to help honor the past as the newest ship sails into the future – the BB-16 from World I and the BB-62 from World War II. Middletown is proud to support the U.S. Navy, and we wish the crew "fair winds and following seas" in their future endeavors.

ACCELERATED TAX SALE: DECEMBER 18, 2024

In New Jersey, all municipalities are required to hold at least one tax sale per year. The 2024 Accelerated Tax Sale for the Township of Middletown will be an ELECTRONIC TAX SALE held on Wednesday, December 18th for DELINQUENT TAXES.

All properties sold at Tax Sale are for delinquent municipal charges for the tax year 2024 and prior years. State law regarding the New Jersey Tax Sale process can be found in New Jersey statute: N.J.S.A 54:5-19 etc. The New Jersey statutes can be found at the Middletown Township Public Library (55 New Monmouth Road) or online at www.njleg.state.nj.us.

Please note the Tax Sale process will begin automatically on Tuesday, November 12th. Per this process, delinquencies will be subject to a 2% cost of sale (minimum \$15 but no more than \$100). In addition, delinquencies will be subject to a mailing fee of \$25 for each mailing. Two mailings are scheduled for this process. THESE FEES ARE REQUIRED AS PART OF THE TAX SALE PROCESS AND CANNOT BE WAIVED.

ALL payments received after November 12th for property taxes MUST be made using guaranteed funds: attorney trust check, title company check, cashier's check, cash and/or money order to remove the property from the Tax Sale process. Any other form of payment will not be accepted. All other checks — online, personal, and business — will be returned. In addition, the credit card/ACH payment options will not be available after 4:00 PM on November 12th for anyone in the Tax Sale process.

- Expedited Service (3 Weeks): \$60.00 in addition to Routine Service Fee




Commissioned by Monmouth Timeline

In December of 1779, during the height of the Revolution, the British privateer ship Britannia was anchored inside of Sandy Hook. During a storm, it broke loose of its moorings and began to float toward the bayshore. The Monmouth Militia spied this and swiftly captured the vessel somewhere around Port Monmouth. The cargo on the ship was sold and split among the militiamen to support their families.

This 2023 painting depicts that event, and it can be seen in person at the Middletown Township Public Library (55 New Monmouth Road). It was painted by Steve Schreiber for www.monmouthtimeline.org, which then gifted it to the Middletown Township Historical Society. Thanks to all those parties, as well as Maureen Foster who researched and wrote about the event.



15 Percent Reduction of NJ Transit Parking Fees

In response to the statewide 15 percent New Jersey Transit fare hike in July, Mayor Tony Perry and the Middletown Township Committee introduced a 15 percent reduction in NJ Transit parking fees within Middletown, aiming to ease the financial strain on our commuters. Fees are reduced at the Middletown Train Station main parking lot, the daily metered train station parking lot, and the bus commuter parking lots.



If the service line is confirmed to be lead or galvanized, NJAW will work to have those service lines replaced in accordance with the company's replacement plan.

The water provided by NJAW currently meets state and federal water quality standards, including those set for lead, so you can continue to use the water as you normally would. This little girl was brought to the fabulous fox rehabber, Karen Cooper at Cooper's Fox Den, who named her Atlanta. With Karen's love, hard work, and expertise over the course of three months, Atlanta was released back to her home healthier than ever before!


Any wild animal that Animal Control picks up is a candidate for rehab. "If the animal is really suffering, it may need veterinarian intervention instead," said Middletown Animal Control Supervisor William Doherty. "However, many of our wild animal calls end with us bringing the animal directly to rehab or to the local shelter for transport to rehab."

Animal Control is available 24/7 for sick or injured animals. Animal Control Officers (ACOs) do this kind of work every day for sick or injured birds, foxes, raccoons, opossums, etc.

If you need assistance with an injured or sick animal, you can call the office between the hours of 8:00 AM to 4:00 PM during the week. After 4:00 PM or on the weekends, you can contact the non-emergency police number at 732-615-2100 and they will dispatch the on-call ACO.

Standing Water Breeds Mosquitoes

With recent reports of West Nile Virus in our area, it's important to take measures to reduce mosquitoes around your home. They can also spread diseases like Eastern Equine Encephalitis, Zika Virus, and heartworm to people, household pets, and horses.

All mosquitoes need standing water to grow. It only takes about a week for mosquito eggs to hatch, grow, and then fly away as adults ready to bite. Check for sources of standing water in your yard and surroundings, such as old tires/tire swings, pool covers, children's pools and toys, plastic tarps, bird baths, garden ponds, buckets, fountains, wheelbarrows, clogged rain gutters, and uncovered trash cans.

If you live near a cemetery, you may find that the standing water left in flower vases on graves can become a breeding ground for mosquitoes. If you plan to use a flower vase or notice a flower vase holding water, add water crystals so they can soak up the water and turn it into a gel. This will help eliminate the mosquito breeding source while also keeping flowers fresh. Water crystals are free of charge and usually available at cemetery offices.

Tips to Reduce Mosquitoes Around Your Home:

- Throw out items that hold water but are not wanted or needed (like old tires)
- Empty water from flowerpots and plants saucers around the garden twice a week
- Cover or turn over items that are wanted but don't need to hold water (like buckets)
- Change the water at least once a week in items that should hold water (like birdbaths)
- Put fish in garden ponds or fountains







PORT MONMOUTH FLOOD CONTROL PROJECT UPDATE

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' flood control project continues along Comptons Creek in Port Monmouth. A levee was recently constructed from the bay beach to a new stormwater pumping station on Main Street. This new tidal barrier is already providing storm protection to the area, while Port Monmouth Road continues to be raised and the completion of the new pumping station draws near. The floodwall from the new pumping station to Broadway will be the final component of Contract 5, which will be completed by June 2025.



The Main Street Stormwater Pumping Station is under construction and will be fully operational by the spring.

Contract 4, which will include an additional floodwall along Route 36 and Creek Road, as well as road closure gates at Campbell Avenue and Broadway, is the last piece of this major flood protection operation. Work is expected to begin in December 2024.

Previous phases of the project are already defending residents against significant flooding and property damage. These completed elements consist of a floodwall along Port Monmouth Road, a road closure gate at Old Port Monmouth Road, and a pump station and floodgate in Pews Creek. The entire Port Monmouth Flood Control Project is expected to be completed in mid-2027.

Residents can bring leaves to the Middletown Recycling Center (52 Kanes Lane) from November 1st until June 1st. Brush is accepted year-round for residents.


